

FRENCH CAPTURE IMPORTANT TOWN OF BERRY-AU-BAC

Commands Large Portion of Aisne River Valley— Its Occupation Marks Advance Far to North of Rheims — Successful Operations North of St. Quentin Reported.

BRITISH ADVANCE NORTH OF SCARPE

Send Line Forward on Front of Four Miles, Taking Villages of Biache-St. Vaast and Oppy— Prisoners and Guns Captured—Progress Made South of Cambrai.

PARIS, Oct. 7.—The French have captured Berry-au-Bac, the War Office announces tonight.

The statement says:

"We have captured Berry-au-Bac.

"Northeast of St. Quentin local operations to improve our positions gave fine results. Seven hundred prisoners were taken in the past twenty-four hours."

British Line Advanced

LONDON, Oct. 7.—The British line has been advanced on a front of four miles north of the Scarpe, Field Marshal Haig reports tonight. The villages of Biache-St. Vaast and Oppy were captured. The statement reads.

"In successful local operations this morning we advanced our line on a front of about four miles north of the Scarpe River, capturing the villages of Biache-St. Vaast and Oppy, with more than 100 prisoners and a number of machine guns.

CANNOT THINK OF ARMISTICE

Allied Armies Are Now in Position to Inflict Severe Defeats on Germans and Compel Their Retreat.

CESSATION WOULD PERMIT RECUPERATION

Enemy Could Save His Men in Unhampered Withdrawal and Replace Much of His Lost Material.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, Oct 7 - "Victory first, then peace."

This is the manner in which French civilians who have returned to their shell-wrecked homes in Northern France expressed themselves when the subject of an armistic was discussed.

The same idea runs through the minds of all the Allied armies, where men have seen their communical dreand where the feeling is that they have died in value unless victory is attenduced.

The auspension of hostilities, even for a few days, would enable the fermans to continue their preparations of lines to which they might retire. The moment the Hindenburg system has been smashed the German military leaders have every reason to believe they may soon be fighting back over country in which at present they have no lines, no dugouts, no protection from the Allied advancing troops.

The Allied armies are in a strong and advantageous position, and the general feeling here is that the defeat of Germany may come sooner than expected.

FRENCH FLEET ENTERS BEIRUT

PARIS, Oct. 7.—A French naval division operating off the coam of Syria entered Beirut this morning. The enthusiasm of the populace was indescribable.

The official communication announcing the taking of the port follows:

"A French fleet entered the port of Beirut at 6 o'clock this morning among indescribable enthusiasm on the part of the people."

Beirut, capital of the vilayet of the same name, is the chief seaport of Syria. It is situated on the Mediterranean seventyfive miles northwest of Damascus. Before the war Beirut had a population of more than 150, 000, two-thirds being Christians.

FACE DIFFICULTY IN NEAR EAST

Central Powers Are Placed in

AMERICANS TAKE ARGONNE POSITION

Force Enemy Out of Chalet Chehery, Northwest of Apremont and Plant Themselves on Commanding Heights West of River Aire—Valiant Dash at Early Hour.

DIFFICULT HILLS TAKEN AFTER SEVERE FIGHTING

Infantry Detachments Storm Trenches With Hand Grenades—German Artillery Fire Reported to Be Moderating—Movements of Guns to North Are Noted.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTHWEST OF VER-DUN, Oct 7.—The Americans achieved another important local suctess today by forcing the Germans out of Chalet Chehery, northwest of Apremont. Pushing forward, they overcame the stubborn resistance of the enemy and settled thecselves on the commanding heights west of the river Aire.

Nothing of importance occurred on the other portions of the American front throughout today.

The attack which culminated in the capture of Chalet Chehery began this morning by the left and left centre troops from just north of Hill 223 to the western edge of the Argonne, where the French to the left joined in the assault. The infantry went forward at 5 o'clock, the troops on the east crossing the Aire.

A heavy mist afforded the men good protection while it lasted. Beyond the river the men were infiltrated through the hill between Hill 180 and Hill 223. Thence they worked into the wood beyond and attacked and carried Hill 180 after hard fighting.

The Germans began the withdrawal of their artillery when they saw the attack was likely to prove successful.

Reach Objective

The troops in the centre of attack mot the first obstacle 16 minutes after starting in the shape of Gorman trenches. The Americans deluged these with hand grenades, car-

At any peace conference, on the terms the Central Powers are now willing to negotiate, would be found representatives of those who ordered the destruction of the Lusitania, who decreed the murder of Nurse Cavell and Captain Pryatt, who shot Belgian civillans to cold blood, who fired towns in a spirit of wanton destruction, who bombed hospiticle and sunk hospital ships, who presented wells and drove the in-usbitants of perupted countries into slavery. Data is geographically distributed








